The management receives the information and sends necessary guidelines to the institution. All computers are interlinked in the office and office and the administration related information is monitored and controlled by the Office Superintendent and the Principal

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

Members of the faculty attended the workshop on framing of the syllabi of different subjects arranged by board of studies and Karnatak University Commerce Teachers Association and make necessary suggestions. The management deputes the faculty for curricular development works

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Effective teaching and learning are carried out by using ICT, Star Boards, Computers and Projectors which are installed in every class room. Individual attention and care are given to each student by interactions, seminars and assignment books which each student is made to write & submit.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Two internal assessments are held in each semester at the college level and the same are evaluated & the progress of the student monitored. University conducts Semester end examinations and the evaluation is done centrally on the university campus. The members of the teaching staff work as paper setters, chairmen, moderators and examiners at the University valuation camps.

6.3.4 Research and Development

The management insists on the teaching staff for taking up research work and sends them on deputation/ study leave for research work. Many of the members of the faculty have obtained M. Phil and Ph. D degrees and completed research projects. Some of the teachers are currently working on minor research projects

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Book bank facilities, remedial book facilities, Books to meritorious students, Automation of library service, E-journals, Internet facilities and Drinking water facilities.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The management holds at least two meetings in a year with the entire staff and reviews the achievement and progress of the institution and the individual staff members. The management issues necessary guidelines and instructions to the institution and the individual staff members for further improvement. The management urges the staff to augment their academic capacities by participating in seminars, workshops and presenting papers

The college started a novel practice of making final year students write Project Reports. The college started a novel practice of developing research orientation among students. According to this idea, the final year B.Com students were made to write project reports on different subjects or problems given to them and submit the same under the guidance of the lecturers concerned. The students worked as teams and submitted the project reports for which they were given merit certificates at the special function. This innovative practice has helped to promote research culture among students.
